Art sales benefit the East Hampton Food Pantry.

Support of the Food Pantry from the community is needed as never before. Last year, around 37,000 people were fed by the East Hampton Food Pantry. This number may be a shock to most, even those who live in this unique and affluent community.

East Hampton Food Pantry operates almost solely on donations. They spend about \$150,000 per year on food. They offer their clients fresh produce (both fruits and vegetables) and fresh dairy (milk, eggs, cheese and butter). The entire East Hampton Town community (from Wainscott to Montauk) is served.
