Happy Birthday! Celebrate with Art by Jackson Pollock.

The artist Jackson Pollock is almost synonymous with Hamptons art history. Called by Peggy Guggenheim "the greatest painter since Picasso," Pollock spent his later years living and working in The Springs, New York (outside of East Hampton Village). Pollock's home, which he shared with the painter Lee Krasner (1908-1984), and his art studio has been preserved as the Pollock-Krasner House and Research Center so visitors can see where the drip paintings were made and the couple lived. Expect to wear booties to preserve the paint on the barn floor.

To help celebrate Pollock's birthday (January 28, 1912), we've gathered a selection of his art. Keep scrolling to take see artworks that have been exhibited at New York museums, galleries or the Pollock-Krasner House and Study Center.

Jackson Pollock (1912–1956) is an American Abstract Expressionism artist known for his "action paintings", which were radical as they broke new ground in style and technique. Jackson Pollock's influences include Native American art, Mexican murals, European modernism, Surrealism, Cubism, Jungian psychology and Thomas Hart Benton's rhythmic use of painting.
