

Films Featuring Artists Screen at Hamptons Film Festival

The Hamptons International Film Festival returns to The Hamptons to present its 23rd annual festival. Held October 8 to 12, 2015 at theaters from Southampton to Montauk, the film line up is diverse and the stars are plentiful with red carpets rolled out daily throughout Columbus Day Weekend, enlivening The Hamptons in a dramatic grand hurrah.

Expected to show are Emily Blunt, Michael Moore, Dan Rather, Dennis Quaid and others, including Steven Spielberg whose "Bridge of Spies" closes the Hamptons film festival on Monday at Guild Hall.

"Our Spotlight and World Cinema films, from all around the world and right here in the Hamptons, make up the heart of our Festival's line up, and we are so proud of this year's selections," said HIFF Artistic Director David Nugent. "In addition, it is an honor for us to close our 23rd festival with Steven Spielberg's new film, as he was a part of our very first edition."

The Russian Woodpecker

Screens Oct. 9 at 11:30 a.m. and Oct. 10 at noon in East Hampton and Sag Harbor

The Chernobyl disaster remains a mystery and for **Ukrainian artist Fedor Alexandrovic**, it fuels an obsession. Haunted by the events that forced his family to evacuate, Fedor begins to investigate the Duga, a massive radio antenna next to the nuclear plant. Once the most expensive Cold War weapon and possibly the key to understanding the explosion, the Duga leads Fedor and filmmaker Chad Gracia on a wild hunt for the truth. Weaving Soviet history with the current events in Ukraine, the Sundance Grand Jury prizewinner <u>THE RUSSIAN WOODPECKER</u> is a highly thrilling documentary about an artist's courage and determination.

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Harry Benson: Shoot First

HARRY BENSON: SHOOT FIRST chronicles the illustrious career of the prolific **photographer Harry Benson** who initially rose to fame alongside The Beatles, having been assigned to cover their inaugural trip to the United States. With unprecedented "behind the scenes" access, Benson captured some of the most vibrant and intimate portraits ever taken of the most popular band in history. His extensive portfolio includes iconic images of Winston Churchill, Bobby Fischer, Muhammad Ali, Greta Garbo, Michael Jackson, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and the Robert F. Kennedy assassination. Now 85, workaholic Benson has no intention of stopping.
