5 Things to Do in NYC Through November 1, 2015

Halloween festivities abound this weekend in New York City, but there are also plenty of nonmacabre things to do. Following is our short list of what to do in New York City starting Thursday night through Sunday.

1. Jewish Museum Art and Politics Talk

Multimedia artists Andrea Bowers, Sharon Hayes, and artist and <u>Raqs Media Collective</u> curator Shuddhabrata Sengupta will be on a panel titled "Dialogue and Discourse: Confronting the Political" at the Jewish Museum on Thursday, October 29, 2015 from 6:30 p.m. to 8 p.m.

The discussion, centering on how art and politics have evolved together from the early 20th century onward, is presented with the museum's exhibition, "The Power of Pictures: Early Soviet Photography, Early Soviet Film," on view until February 7, 2016. Moderating will be <u>Nato Thompson</u>, a former curator at MASS MoCA and the current Chief Curator of Creative Time, which commissions and presents public art projects worldwide.

"Dialogue and Discourse" is a regular series of conversations related to museum exhibitions, with more programming planned. RSVPs recommended. Admission is pay-what-you-wish. 2. "The Color Purple" Conversation

Alice Walker, author of the 1982 Pulitzer Prize-winning novel *The Color Purple*—which returns to Broadway in a new production on December 10, 2015—joins Tony Award-winning director John Doyle, Oscar-winning actress Jennifer Hudson and British stage actress Cynthia Erivo for a panel discussion on the upcoming production on Thursday, October 29, 2015 from 7:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the New School. 3. John Zorn Festival

A month-long festival celebrating avant-garde composer John Zorn at Brooklyn's National Sawdust culminates with two concerns on Halloween evening.

The first, at 8 p.m. and titled "Magikal Chamber Music," features the works "Walpurgisnacht," "Gri Gri," "All Hallows Eve," Hexantarot," and "Ghosts." The concert also sees a world premier. Inspired by Zorn's fanaticism of writer Aleister Crowley, the program features violinist Chris Otto, violist Kyle Armbrust, cellist Jay Campbell, pianist Steve Gosling and percussionist William Winant.

The second, at 10 p.m., is a performance of Zorn's 2015 album, "Simulacrum," featuring organist John Medeski, guitarist Matt Hollenberg and drummer Kenny Grohowski.

4. Village Halloween Parade

The 42nd annual Village Halloween Parade in downtown Manhattan is set to crawl up Sixth Avenue from Spring Street to 16th Street on Saturday, October 31 from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m. Those who wish to march alongside the more than 50,000 costumed street performers, dancers, and those manning larger-than-life masks and puppets must assemble in costume on Sixth Avenue and Canal Street at 6:30 p.m. Artistic and Producing Director Jeanne Flemming announced this year's <u>theme</u> is "Shine a Light."

Artists have a long history in the parade: Organizers commission three artists or groups to conceive and make giant puppets for the year's theme. The art and performance space HERE Art Center presents The Dream Music Puppetry Program—led by HERE co-founder Barbara Busackino and puppeteer and MacArthur Foundation fellow <u>Basil Twist</u>—which enlists volunteer puppet creators. This year, Twist's "Giant Spider" returns to dangle off the parade-side Jefferson Market Library after a five-year hiatus during library construction. Free.
