

5 Things to Do in NYC Through December 6, 2015

Want to find art and culture things to do in New York City this weekend? Here's a brief list. Expect a talk, a Victorian Christmas lantern show, a world premier of a dance work, an opera holiday singalong, and more through December 6, 2015.

1. A Conversation On Mark Rothko With Christopher Rothko

Drawing from his newly published volume of 18 essays titled <u>Mark Rothko: From the Inside</u> <u>Out</u> (Yale University Press), the artist's son Christopher Rothko will speak on the "the range, meaning, and impact" of his father's body of work at the Metropolitan Museum of Art on Thursday, December 3 at 6:30 p.m. The talk is part of the Met's Ticket Talks series, regularly programmed lectures by curators and experts, and takes place in the museum's Grace Rainey Rogers Auditorium.

2. World Premier of Tere O'Connor's *The Goodbye Studies*

Chelsea performing arts venue The Kitchen presents the world premier of a new dance work by dancer and choreographer <u>Tere O'Connor</u> titled *The Goodbye Studies*, which has 8 p.m. performances Thursday to Saturday (December 3 – 5). Involving 12 New York-based performers, O'Connor's work "promotes complexity as a key feature of consciousness and seeks to fully detach from comprehension as a value" and continues O'Connor's "decades-long commitment to strictly movement-based investigations." There's a score by longtime O'Connor collaborator James Baker and lighting and design by Michael O'Connor.

3. Coney Island First Saturday at the Brooklyn Museum

The Brooklyn Museum presents an evening of music, talks, performances and more celebrating all things Coney Island on Saturday, December 5 from 5 to 11 p.m. The event, part of the museum's Target Free First Saturdays series, is tied to the exhibition *Coney Island: Visions of an American Dreamland 1861-2008*, on view through March 13, 2016.

Expect different events every hour, including a curator tour and following Q & A on the exhibition led by Robin Jaffee Frank, chief curator of the Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art; a screening of the 1978 film *The Wiz*; a book club discussion with photographer Harvey Stein, who speaks on his book of 200 photographs titled *Coney Island: 40 Years 1970-2010* (Schiffer Publishing); a performance by Brooklyn-based gypsy band Amour Obscur; and a presentation of BodySpeak, a burlesque performance touching on historical, political and social issues by Brown Girls Burlesque.

Also find pop-up gallery talks by museum staff and performances of classic Coney Island sideshow acts curated by Adam Rinn, professor of Sideshow Arts at Coney Island University.

There's also a screening of the 2015 short film *Radiant Presence* and a following conversation with Ted Kerr, Shawn Torres, Rusti Miller-Hill, Jawanza Williams about the "use of art and social media in AIDS activism to combat stigma and increase awareness and esteem for people with HIV." The screening and talk is planned in conjunction with World AIDS Day/Day With(out) Art, which took place on December 1.

4. A Victorian Christmas Magic-Lantern Show

The Museum of the City of New York presents a 1890s-style magic-lantern show created by <u>The American Magic-Lantern Theater</u> and its director Terry Borton on Sunday, December 6 at 3 p.m. at the museum. The performance incorporates projected color images using antique projection equipment, live music and audience participation. Expect stories by Hans Christian Anderson and holiday carols. The program is presented in conjunction with the museum's exhibition *Jacob A. Riis: New York's Other Half* and aims to bring alive how people were entertained during the time of Riis, a photojournalist who was also known for giving lectures using lantern slides. The exhibition is on view through March 20, 2016 with additional programming planned.

Expect operatic songs, traditional carols and modern songs sung by competition finalists joined by coloratura soprano Erin Morley. Opera singers Matthew Anchel, Felicia Moore, Brian Michael Moore and Virginie Verrez will also perform. Children encouraged for the 6 p.m. performance.
