The Outsider Art Fair, Master Drawings New York and festivals in film, choreography and more abound this week and weekend in New York City. Thursday night is a busy one with two art fairs opening, NYC Restaurant Week and the New York Jewish Film Festival underway with even more things to do on Friday and Saturday nights. Keep reading to discover some of the best ways to spend your time in New York City with our picks of things to do in art and culture through January 24, 2016. Expect to find food, dance, film, music, art and more.

1. NYC Restaurant Week

The semi-annual New York City Restaurant Week is held from January 18 through February 5, 2016. Over 300 participating restaurants in all five boroughs offer prix fixe three-course lunch and dinner menus. Lunch courses are \$25 per person and dinner courses are \$38 per person. 2. The New York Jewish Film Festival

The 25th annual New York Jewish Film Festival runs from January 13 to 26, 2016 at Lincoln Center's Walter Reade Theater and the Elinor Bunin Munroe Film Center. Screenings take place almost daily (except for Fridays) with special panels and events offered in addition to film screenings. The film festival features 38 narratives, documentaries and shorts from several countries revealing "the diversity of the Jewish experience around the world."

Special events include Q&A sessions with filmmakers, a Master Class, and a film poster exhibition "[Celluloid on Paper](#)" at the Walter Reade Theater. One call out is a concert on Sunday, January 24, at 1 p.m. recreating a historic one by violinist Stuart Canin and pianist Thomas Sauer immediately held after the documentary screening of "[The Rifleman's Violin](#)" chronically Canin's 1945

performance for Truman, Churchill and Stalin.

Tickets to the New York Jewish Film Festival are \$14, \$11 for students and seniors, and \$9 for members of the film society and Jewish Museum. The Walter Reade Theater is located in Lincoln Center, at 165 West 65 Street, New York NY 10023. www.nyjff.org.

3. FLICfest Independent Choreography Festival

FLICfest takes place from January 21 - 30, 2016 at Irondale Center, a performing arts theater in Brooklyn. Held Thursdays through Saturday, each event presents two feature-length dance theater works by independent choreographers followed by a performance cabaret in the balcony lounge. Featured choreographers are Taylor Drury, Hattie Mae Williams with Tattooed Ballerinas, Angel Chinn with the Nona Lee Dance Company, Joya Powell with Movement of the People, Beck Heiberg and Donofrio Dance Company.

4. Japanese Winter Feast at Brooklyn Botanic Garden

5. Panel Discussion on “Contemporary Space in Contemporary Art” at New Museum

New Museum presents the panel discussion “Cheryl Donegan: Fold, Screen, Skin: Contemporary Space in Contemporary Art” on Saturday, January 23 at 3 p.m. The panel of artists and curators explores the compression of three-dimensional space on two-dimensional surfaces, and the pressures placed on subjects as they move between physical and virtual platforms and the economies of attention embedded within these spaces. The panel is in support of the exhibition and artist residency “Cheryl Donegan: Scenes + Commercials”, exhibited January 20 to April 10, 2016 at the New Museum.
