The New York Earth Room

This permanent installation in Soho is open year round, but it could serve as the perfect respite from the clamor of the art fairs. Walter De Maria's "earth sculpture" consists of 250 cubic yards of dirt covering 3,600 square feet of floor space in an empty apartment. It's worth a visit just to witness the spectacle, but the experience is also uniquely serene and could provide a much-needed opportunity for introspection.

Isa Genzken's "Two Orchids" in Central Park

Isa Genzken's towering sculpture "Two Orchids" will be on display beginning on Tuesday, March 1, 2016 in the Doris C. Freedman Plaza in the Southeast Corner of Central Park. The stainless steel sculpture depicting two orchids rises 34 feet in height and achieves a deceptively delicate appearance despite it's construction. If stopping by to see the sculpture inspires you to see the real thing, you can head up to the <u>New York Botanical Garden's Orchid Show</u>, on view through April 17, 2016 in the Bronx.

Maria Hassabi: PLASTIC at MoMA

Maria Hassabi's *PLASTIC* will be performed during open hours at MoMA through March 20, 2016. The live installation is composed of dancers moving at a barely perceptible pace continuously throughout the museum. Dancers at times seem to pose in a position of collapse or transition in a performance with no obvious beginning or end. The piece encourages visitors to closely observe small shifts in performers' motions over time in order to explore the tension between stillness and movement.

"Closed Worlds" at Storefront for Art and Architecture

If you find yourself downtown this week, take a detour to pass by "Closed Worlds" at the Storefront for Art and Architecture, on view through April 9, 2016. The small, avant-garde exhibition space

displays rotating shows of international design and architecture. The space itself is worth a look, an 100-foot long façade with a series of twelve movable panels that pivot vertically or horizontally to open the entire length of the gallery directly onto the street. On view now is an exhibition of prototypes of closed system, self-sustaining living environments (think space capsules and submarines).
