1. ICP Film Series at Anthology Film Archives

The International Center of Photography and Anthology Film Archives presents "Film Series: Voyeurism, Surveillance, and Identity in the Cinema" from **November 25 to 27, 2016** at Anthology Film Archives.

ICP and Anthology Film Archives continue their ongoing collaboration with a second film series inspired by the new ICP Museum's inaugural exhibition, "Public, Private, Secret" (on view through January 8, 2017). Combining narrative films like "Body Double" and "A Short Film About Love" with experimental films, documentaries, and video art, the series demonstrates how the ideas of voyeurism, surveillance, and identity have been central throughout the history of cinema. 3. Digital Art Criticism Now at The Whitney

The Whitney Museum of American Art presents "New Ways To See: Digital Art Criticism Now" on Tuesday, November 29, 2016 from 6:30 to 8 p.m. The discussion will be held on floor three in the Susan and John Hess Family Theater.

Christiane Paul and Nora Khan—recipients of the Thoma Foundation's 2016 Arts Writing Awards in Digital Art—discuss current issues in digital art with <u>lan Cheng</u> and <u>Clement Valla</u>, two artists on whose work they have written. Paul, Khan, and the artists will talk about topics explored in their respective writings and projects, with a focus on the ways in which networked technologies and computation shape and place productive pressure on creative expression. They will also discuss challenges inherent in writing about digital art, and will address the ways in which both artists would like to see their work represented and analyzed in arts publications. Brian Droitcour, Associate Editor and Online Editor at Art in America will moderate the discussion.

4. Reading and Book Signing

Aperture presents "Reading and Book Signing with Justine Kurland and Lynne Tillman" on **Tuesday, November 29, 2016 from 6:30 to 8 p.m.** at Aperture Gallery and Bookstore.

A question and answer and a book signing will follow a reading with <u>Justine Kurland</u> and <u>Lynne Tillman</u> from their new book "Highway Kind" (published by Aperture, 160 pages, 85 four-color images, hardcover, released October 2016). The book includes photography by Kurland and stories by Tillman. Kurland, known for her utopian photographs of American landscapes and their fringe communities, has spent the better part of the last twelve years on the road. Justine Kurland's (b. 1969) work has been exhibited extensively at museums in the United States and internationally.

Her work is in the public collections of institutions including the Whitney Museum of American Art, Guggenheim Museum, and International Center of Photography, New York, among others. Lynne Tillman is a novelist, storywriter, and critic.

5. "On The Road" at BAM

BAM presents the NY Premiere of "On The Road" from **November 30 to December 3, 2016 at 7:30 p.m.** at BAM Fisher.

Six decades after the bible of the Beat Generation was published, choreographer <u>Zvi Gotheiner</u> and his company set out to retrace Jack Kerouac's most infamous route, tumbling west over the Rockies toward whatever revelations America's roadways might yield today. The result is this work, with original music by composer <u>Jukka Rintamäki</u>, and kaleidoscopic video footage acquired along the way, courtesy of the artist <u>Josh Higgason</u>. Filtering the desire of the Beats through the vantage of the present, "On the Road" is a danced meditation on youth, freedom, and the call of the open road. Part of the <u>2016 New Wave Festival</u>.
