SOCIAL SCENE: Sold Out Watermill Center Benefit Draws Celebs & Raises over \$2 Million

A celebrity-drenched crowd of over 1,200 gathered at Watermill Center to celebrate its 2017 Summer Benefit 'FLY INTO THE SUN.' The 24th annual gala-the highlight of the Hamptons benefit season-raised over \$2 million, so far, benefiting its year-round artist residency and education programming, according to Watermill Center. The sold out event honored Laurie Anderson and Isabelle Huppert in tribute to the late musician Lou Reed.

Throughout the cocktail portion of the evening, guests mingled amidst the performance art, social photographers, art stars, friends and art installed beneath the tent for a silent auction featuring over 100 art works. Adopting the dress code of "Dark Shiny Matter," luminaries from art, architecture, fashion, music, performance and Hollywood mingled at the gala.

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Upon entering the Watermill Center grounds, guests were greeted by a colorful, large-scale installation by New York based artist Jared Madere and specialty cocktails by Tequila Don Julio titled "After Hours." The durational performances begun immediately with the first featuring Somos Monstros (Raúl de Nieves & Erik Zajaceskowski).

Sited among the 8.5-acre grounds were over 20 site-specific works and performances curated by Noah Khoshbin and Ivan Cheng in tribute to Lou Reed's life and work, positioned throughout the Center's 8.5-acre grounds. <u>Click here</u> to read a Critic's View of the performance art by James Croak for Hamptons Art Hub.

Difficult to miss was a 90-foot wall featuring Jenny Holzer's iconic, minimalist text reading "She Outwits Him / She Outlives Him" on the north side. The south side of the wall served as platform for artistic expressions by Summer Program Participant artists, Jokubas Nosovas, Nikitas Broukakis and Sam Khoshbin. Taking a cue from last year's participatory project by <u>Bruce High Quality Foundation</u> of Brooklyn at <u>Watermill Center Gala 2016</u>, this year's attendees were able to make their own mark by using spray paint in a variety of colors.

Performances unfolding along a tiki torch-lined path included <u>Storyboard P</u>'s "Formless Expressions," <u>Kate Gilmore'</u>s "Beat," <u>Nile Harris</u>'s "Monkey on His Back (Love Laboratory)" featuring a man nearly buried under a towering pile of bananas, conceptual artist <u>Stephen Shanabrook</u>'s sculpture of a headless man with cotton candy left for brains, and the performance piece "Salute" by Croatian artist <u>Vesna Mackovic</u>. Also performed were works by artists Rachel Frank, <u>Christopher Knowles</u>, Xu Zhen and others.

After cocktails, over 500 dinner guests retired to the sequestered dining tent for a family-style meal by BITE. Robert Wilson welcomed the crowd and introduced Claude Grunitzky, newly named the first President of the Byrd Hoffman Water Mill Foundation along with this year's 80 participants of Watermill Center's International Summer Program.

Inviting honorees Laurie Anderson and Isabelle Huppert to the stage, Wilson called for donations to support The Center's year-round Artist Residency Program which was dramatically embraced by <u>Robert Downey Jr</u>., who leaped to the stage with a bid of over \$5,000, according to Watermill Center. The evening continued with a live auction led by auctioneer Simon de Pury.

When the clock struck midnight, guests drifted into the darkened night with a final artist gift-a limited edition tote bags designed by <u>Jenny Holzer</u>.
