Screening of Documentary “Landfill Harmonic”

The Parrish Art Museum presents “Family Night Film, Landfill Harmonic” on **Friday, February 23, 2018, from 6 to 8 p.m.**

“[Landfill Harmonic](#)” (NR, 85 minutes, 2015), is a documentary that follows the journey of the [Recycled Orchestra of Cateura](#), a Paraguayan musical group that plays instruments made entirely out of garbage. The film, directed by Brad Allgood and Graham Townsley, co-directed by Juliana Penaranda-Loftus, is a testimony to the transformative power of music and the resilience of the human spirit.

[“Call Me By Your Name”](#) (R | 132min | English) is directed by Luca Guadagnino and written by James Ivory. In Northern Italy in the summer of 1983, Elio Perlman, (Timothée Chalamet) is a 17-year-old American spending his days in his family’s 17th century villa transcribing music. One day, Oliver (Armie Hammer), a 24-year-old graduate student working on his doctorate, arrives as the summer intern to assist Elio’s father (Michael Stuhlbarg), a professor specializing in Greco-Roman culture. Soon, Elio and Oliver begin to experience a summer that will alter their lives.

Your Voices: A Celebration of Music, Culture & Tradition

Sylvester Manor Educational Farm and the Eastville Community Historical Society partner to present the Fourth annual Black History Month event “Lift Your Voices: A Celebration of Music, Culture & Tradition” on **Sunday, February 25, 2018 from 2 to 4 p.m.** at Bay Street Theater.

The program consists of a panel discussion on the musical history and traditions from diverse communities including African American and Native American cultures. Panelists will explore the intersection and interconnections of musical genres and how cultures and traditions merge creating a universal language of music from Gospel to Blues and Jazz, and from Roots music to tribal rhythms.
