1. Live Theater: "On Golden Pond"

Guild Hall co-presents a screening of "Shoplifters" on **Saturday, January 19, 2018 at 6 p.m.** in partnership with the Hamptons International Film Festival.

Set in on the margins of Tokyo, a dysfunctional band of outsiders are united by fierce loyalty, a penchant for petty theft and playful grifting. When the young son is arrested, secrets are exposed that upend their tenuous, below-the-radar existence and test their quietly radical belief that it is love—not blood—that defines a family.
