Art News: Eric Fischl Curates, Climate Change Gets its Due, Lee Krasner Painting May Break Record and More News to Know

Have a minute? Get caught up with news from the NY Metro Art Scene and the artists that make it a vibrant one.

Lee Krasner's *The Eye is the First Circle*, 1960, is already turning heads with an estimated \$10 million to \$15 million pricetag when it goes up for auction during Sotheby's contemporary art evening sale on May 16, 2019. If it sells, it will break her current auction record set by *Shattered Light*, 1954, which sold for \$5.5 million at Christie's New York in November 2017, according to ArtNews.

The Eye is the First Circle was formerly owned by the Pollock Krasner Foundation and was acquired by the current owner in 1996, <u>according to Sotheby's</u>. The painting is due to be part of the upcoming traveling retrospective exhibition "<u>Lee Krasner: In Living Colour</u>" with stops in London, Frankfurt, Bern and Bilbao. It opens at the <u>Barbican</u> in London on May 30, 2019.

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Artist Eric Fischl weighed in as Curatorial Advisor for the exhibition "That 80's Show" currently on view through July 7, 2019 at the Nassau County Museum of Art on Long Island, NY. The group show includes over 100 artworks by artists including Julian Schnabel, April Gornik, David Salle, Ross Bleckner, Bryan Hunt, Basquiat, Keith Haring, Cindy Sherman, Jenny Holzer, Robert Longo and others.

The show also includes fashion memorabilia from the era including Michael Jackson's glove, Madonna's jewelry, couture worn by Prince and sports clothing from the Islanders, the Mets and the 1980 Olympic hockey team. Click <u>here</u> for exhibition details.

"art.now 2019.2019 | metamorphosis: changing climate" features a strong line up of artists including <u>Alexis Rockman</u> (Sperone Westwater); Hugo McCloud (Sean Kelly); <u>Zaria Forman</u> (Winston Wachtler Fine Art); <u>Janet Culbertson</u> (Denise Bibro Fine Art); David Maisel (Edwynn Houk Gallery) and others.

The show was curated by Betty Levin, President of Corporate Art Directions, in conjunction with Heart Director and former COO Gil Mauer. The show remains on view through September 2019.
