Presented across the entire museum, expect to find stellar artworks from both well-loved and lesser known artists working across disciplines and mediums. Presented at the Emily Lowe Gallery, “[Uncharted: American Abstraction in the Information Age](#)” presents eight acclaimed artists whose work intersects with the worlds of science, math and technology. Exhibiting artists include James O. Clark, [John Goodyear](#) (1930-2019); Lynne Harlow, Daniel G. Hill, Gilbert Hsiao, Irene Rousseau, James Seawright and Patricia Zarate. The selected art may be two-dimensional, three-dimensional and site-specific; many will defy traditional classification, according to Museum Acting Director and Chief Curator Karen T. Albert.
